Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor Celebrates Its 2,000,000th Visitor Today at the Historic Museum

Honolulu, HI – It's been ten years since Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor opened its doors on Historic Ford Island at Pearl Harbor, December 7, 2006, in the hangars that withstood the bombing of Pearl Harbor. Today, July 18, 2017, the staff and

directors welcomed the 2,000,000th visitor and their family to the Museum, establishing another milestone.

The lucky recipients of lifetime memberships and many Museum gifts were from Burlington, Ontario, Canada and include: Claudia and Alin Serban, son Mihai Serban, and Constantin Sava.

Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor is located on Historic Ford Island, where it still shows the battle scars where bombs fell during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941. Visitors to the Museum can see remnants from that day of infamy, including the 158-foot tall, red and white iconic Ford Island Field Control Tower, Hangars 37 and 79, and bullet holes in Hangar 79. Through its preservation and restoration of World War II fighter planes and accompanying artifacts in the Museum's historic hangars, Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor shares the story of the vital role aviation played in America's winning of World War II, and its continuing role in maintaining America's freedom.
