

You are the newest Oral Historian at Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum. You have been tasked by the Curator to conduct an oral history. The Curator has received requests by several people who want their oral histories taken. Some have contacted the museum directly, and a few have been nominated by others.

Instructions:

- 1. Using the biography cards in this packet, find the individual whose story best fits with our museum's **Call-to-Action Statement** below. Read through the information collected to determine who you would like to interview for our museum's oral history archive.
- 2. Explain in 2-3 sentences why you have selected that individual to be your interview subject.
- 3. Use the **Guide to Oral History** to create 15 interview questions to ask your subject.

Call-to-Action Statement:

Our museum is on the hunt to collect and preserve the stories of people who lived through the World War II, especially those who lived in and around the Pacific Theater (like Hawai'i!). They can be military or everyday people who lived between the years of 1940 and 1947. As an aviation museum, it is important to us to highlight the histories of those who did any job involving any kind of aircrafts for the military, even engineering or mechanics!



Tips for Reading:

- A candidate's age may play a role in your selection. Is there a great risk of losing this history if we do not take immediate action?
- The least obvious choice may be the most interesting story. Look closely at the details in the biographies.
- Military stories are not the only stories. Consider the individuals that did not serve in the military, but contributed to history indirectly in some way.
 Consider where they lived, worked, or was born.



Tips for Question Writing:


- Only use questions that start with: who, what, when, where, why, or
 how. These kinds of questions encourage your subject to explain their
 answers with more than a <u>YES</u> or <u>NO</u>. As oral historians, we want to avoid
 short answers.
- Ask for specific information! You want as many details as they will give you, so your questions need to ask for the exact information that you want.
- Ask your questions in order of time. People think from their oldest memories to newest. Start in the past, and work your way up to the present.

"My name is Jeb Richardson	n. I would like to share my story with your museum
of my time in the US Army a	as a member of the 82 nd Airborne. In May of 1942 I
volunteered for service, just before the elections, and the law change that	
would have brought me into service anyway a few months later. A little more	
patience on my part would have saved my mother a load of grief. Eventually, I	
was sent down to Fort Bragg to train as a paratrooper. I had barely seen planes	
before those days, and there we were training to jump right out of them. Those	
fellows sure meant a lot to me, and more than once did I owe my life to all of	
them. Although I did not make every jump with my brothers, I did know many	
of the brave men that did those jumps. Some of which who never made it to the	
ground."

"My father found his lifelong career as a Police Officer just before the war	
broke out after Pearl Harbo	r. The Territory's Police Department had called for

volunteers a few months before, and he jumped to apply, especially since my grandmother refused to part with him if the US were to join the war. No sooner had he volunteered than Pearl Harbor was bombed, just months after finishing his training. He was a part of the local response and clean-up on December 7th,

he never liked speaking about that day, but did his best to write about them in his journals. For his much needed service to police the territory during the

war, he was allowed to stay and was not drafted. After the war, he stayed on in

the Honolulu Police Department until his retirement in 1987."



"My mother was a student teacher at Farrington High School right before the	

"My mother was a student teacher at Farrington High School right before the war broke out. She lived with her family in Kalihi, and remembers the Pearl Harbor bombing vividly. It was a weekend, so there was no school. She and her family had gone to Mass at St. Anthony's Parish that morning and as services were finishing, they heard faint explosions and gunfire. A few hours later, she remembers ambulances sounding, and over the next few weeks, watched the military turn the high school as a makeshift infirmary for the people who were hurt or killed during the attack. She was not allowed to teach formally for about a year because of martial law, although she tutored some of her students informally. She was able to become a teacher, and taught at Kalihi Kai Elementary until her retirement."



Ford Island. When the war broke out in 1941, he immediately enlisted into the	
Navy to become a pilot. He b	became a Navy Aircraft mechanic for the duration
of the war, but left the military when his service was up. In 1982, I	
interviewed him about his WWII military service for genealogical records. I	
have 2 hours worth of cassette tapes of him describing what he remembered	
about those days, as well as his uniform and medals that he preserved until his	
passing in 1998 at the age of 76."	


